The present activities report covers the activities of the organisation during the second phase of pandemic-April 2021-March 22. During pandemic, needless to say, the livelihood of the households was greatly affected. In order to face the challenge we could mobilize the resources in the form of cash, ration, sanitizer and masks for 500 families in our operational villages in Bhadrak urban areas.

Food and Nutrition Security (FNS) programme that aims to integrate nutrition, agriculture and WASH interventions for improved food and nutrition security using participatory planning and behavior change communication method in 250 house hold of twelve villages of Kadabaruan & Chandigaon panchayat of Bhadrak block and Pradhan Mantri Adharsha Gramya Yojana (PMAGY) in six blocks of Bhadrak districts were additional projects added to our existing programme during the pandemic period. These two projects brought laurel to our organisation along with existing programmes like HIV, Family Counselling Centre, SAKHI, One Stop Centre, Child Care Institution & Swadher Greh.

## **A. About Fellowship:**

### **A.1 What is Fellowship?**

Fellowship, founded in 1978 by a group of committed men and women social activists, is a community-based, non-profit, non-governmental organization. As one of the pioneer organization in the Bhadrak district, Fellowship focuses on the women's issues. Fellowship is opposed to all forms of oppression, exploitation and violence against women. It subscribes to the principles of non-sectarian and social transformation.

### **A.2 Fellowship's Mission**

Fellowship believes in a just and equitable society – a society free from violence, without discrimination based on gender, religion, caste, creed and color. We strive hard to establish the rights of women and other marginalized groups like Transgender community, Sex Workers, Persons Living with HIV and Children by empowering them to take control of their lives, working in a collective manner with other group, initiating and conducting Campaign to end violence against them.

### **A.3. Fellowship's Vision**

We dream of a society free from violence, without discrimination based on gender, religion, caste, sexuality, nationality and physical disability.

### **A.4. Fellowship's Strategy**

In Odisha, where billion of people live in poverty and illiteracy is rampant, women and members of the excluded community face greater risks. Improving their socio-economic condition requires strong and systematic commitment and favorable govt. policies. Fellowship's basic strategy stems from the fact that 'Once the poor and marginalized increased their economic condition and assets, they used these new earnings to improve the education and health status of their families'.

Our inputs are based on the premise that by empowering self-help groups (SHGs) through social empowerment program, women and marginalized in the grassroots can effectively combat violence on them. We believe that dispute resolution through peers counseling, help reduce vulnerability and promote peace in the families. As such, we engage self-help groups in alternative dispute resolution programme called "Vikalpa Mahila Nyaya Panchayat" at the grassroots.

We also believe in collaboration with govt. department to ensure proper implementation of the schemes for the disadvantaged including women, transgender and other sexual minority. Where there is a need, we advocate with the govt. for amendments in policies.

## **B. Flashback – Major Achievements**

### **B.1. Gender Sensitization Training in School:**

Reformation in society with special reference to gender differences is possible only through gender sensitization. Gender and its accompanying power relations are built all institution of society be it family, educational institution, work place, religious systems, beliefs, norms etc. It is the process which brings about changes in the thought process of people who believe man and women as different entities and so have different functions to perform in socio- economic area. ‘Gender’ refers to the socio cultural differences between the males and females in terms of their strength, ability, performance, wage earning capacity and social acceptability etc. In fact the biological process does not discriminate between man and woman, but socially, women are regarded as weak, need protection and hence become subordinate to men.

Gender sensitization refers to the modification of behavior by raising awareness of gender equality concerns. This can be achieved by conducting various sensitization campaigns, workshop, programs etc. Gender sensitization refers to theories which claim that modification of the behavior of teachers and parents (etc.) towards children can have a causal effect on gender equality. Gender sensitization “is about changing behavior and instilling empathy into the views that we hold about our own and the other sex”. It helps people in “examining their personal attitudes and beliefs and questioning the realities they thought they know.

With the objective to sensitize youths on gender, sex and gender based violence, hoe it affects life and peace in society and how we can address the problem in the society; we conducted gender sensitization training programmes in 10 High Schools in Bhadrak and Bont Blocks. More than 2500 adolescents were sensitized under the programme.

The teachers act as facilitators to create gender sensitized environment. The teacher’s role is to provide a safe space for children to express themselves and simultaneously to build in certain forms of interaction. While consolidating and constructively pushing the limits of learner’s understanding, they need to be



conscious of how differences are expressed. Along with the students, we also make programmes to sensitize teachers on gender sensitize teachers on gender issues. And in this prospective more than 60 teachers were trained.

### **B.2. Maitryee Club:**

It was another achievement of Fellowship towards the functioning of Maitryee Clubs in 10 High School in Bhadrak and Bonth Block. The basic objective of functioning of such Maitryee Clubs is to create a knowledge banks at the school level by participatory sharing of knowledge and resources of the learners. These knowledge banks are used as resources centers, where students of both sexes mangle together to share their skills and hobbies like stamp collection, article writing, painting , pomes etc. The concept is becoming popular among the students fast.

### **B.3.Violence Mitigation Committees:**

Men and youth, after joining Violence Mitigation Committees, the resulted effect is very encouraging. Women from excluded communities hitherto facing violence along and helpless are getting support from the VMCs immediately at their door step. Men are raising voice in support of women survivors of violence at appropriate forums. This has proved to be yielding desired result in making the police more responsible and accountable. The VMC not only provide alternative resolution in cases of violence against women at the occurrence but also intervene to wipe them out before a small matter becomes serious – a pro-active approach to end violence on women. Conscious efforts are made to sensitize and involve men and youth in the endeavor.

### **B.4. Alliance Building:**

Alliance building among various stakeholders is the key factor in combating violence against women. Government organizations, local self government institutions, judiciary, non governmental organizations, police and media can contribute a great deal to end violence against women, when they work hand-in-hand. Workshops conducted at block and district level to familiarize the representative of the above institutions, with the provision of Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005. Regular meetings of alliance partners are held to strengthen the bond.

### **B.5. Social inclusion of Minority Community:**

As a part of Social inclusion of minority community, interactive meeting was organized with Muslim community leaders. A two-day training programme on Menstrual Hygiene Management was conducted for 40 adolescent and college going girls. From the feedback of the participants it was evident that the training was very useful and relevant. On Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act 2005, a training programme was conducted for women from the minority community on 24<sup>th</sup> February. 50 women leaders participated in this training programme.

#### **B.6. Initiatives under Protection of Women from Domestic Violence (PWDV) Act, 2005:**

The Act was promulgated in India, but it failed to reach the common people having no effort for public education. From 2007, we have been organizing training, public discussions, seminars and workshops in various parts in the district to raise awareness on the provisions of PWDV Act, 2005. As a result the people in the villages are getting benefit from the training and awareness programme. With the help of VMCs survivors are filing DIR directly with the Protection Officer. By the end of 2017 DIR was filed in the court and judgments of 19 cases were declared by the court.

#### **B.7. Corporate Partnership:**

The CSR initiatives were started in April 2008 by Fellowship aiming to create an enabling working environment for the communities residing within the plant and mine periphery of HCL at Ghatsila of Jharkhand, besides, with the support of IBM we initiated community action in addressing several social issues such as trafficking on women. In the year 2008, we launched a computer literacy program for 200 students in D.N. Girls' High School, Bhadrak.

#### **B.8. Humanitarian Response:**

Fellowship has taken lead role in the district reaching out to the vulnerable and affected community by responding to their needs in natural disaster situations like flood, cyclone and fire accident since a decade. This year in the month of September due to severe flood several villages in Chandabali and Dhamnagar Block were affected. We supported temporary shelter to 1000 households in Padhani, Dhusuri and Bhuinbruti GPs of both the Blocks. Similarly in fire accident cases we have supported tarpaulin sheets and ground sheets to 100 families in Bhandaripokhari and

Tihidi Block of the District. And also we deployed two power boats for distribution of reliefs in the flood affected zones during floods.

## **C. ON-GOING PROGRAMMES**

### **C. 1. Care and support programme:**

#### **C.1.1. Family Counselling Centre:**

Since 2000, a Family Counselling Centre (FCC) is running by Fellowship with support from Central Social Welfare Board (CSWB), New Delhi. Besides dealing with cases of marital disputes, the FCC also educates people on various laws to combat violence against women and also registered and counseled the case of men. The centre closely works with District Legal Aid Service Authority. From January 2019 the FCC is functioning at District Police Office premises (Bhadrak) as Crisis Centre with direct involvement of IUCAW (Investigating Units on Crime Against Women) of Odisha Police. Till date more than 2009 cases are registered, 954 cases settled amicably, 177 cases referred to court, 105 cases to police and 13 cases to One Stop Centre for legal assistance. During the reporting year 130 cases registered in our FCC out of which 76 cases have been resolved at our end, 05 to the One Stop Centre to give them legal assistance.

#### **C.1.2. Swadhar Greh:**

Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi has also sanctioned a Short Stay Home in our favor since 2004. The Short Stay Home subsequently renamed as SWADHAR GREH in 2016 to provides shelter, food, clothing and health care to women and their children who are abandoned or affected by violence. Counselling both psychological and legal, vocational training and legal aid support provided to those women for a maximum period of five years. Moreover, the women who face violence in their families pass through extreme economic crisis in their life. Fellowship supports those women to meet their livelihood who are capable of taking up entrepreneurship initiatives on their own. The reporting year shows, 57 women and 23 children admitted into the Swadhar Greh. After counseling 51 cases have been solved. 15 inmates have been provided with vocational training. 05 inmates rehabilitated on the job. Presently 32 inmates are staying in the Swadhar Greh.

### **C.2. Protecting Rights of children:**



Fellowship runs a Child Care Institute where abandoned, trafficked and run away children, most likely girl children are given shelter and boys are also given shelter up to the age of 12 years. They are provided all the facilities as per the Govt. guidelines such as Child Need in Care and Protection (CNCP). The institute works very closely with the Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Bhadrak and District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), Bhadrak. At present seventeen children are staying in the Child Care Institution. All the children are under our care and protection and we have managed to run the CCI by taking into consideration the entire guidelines on this pandemic situation Covid-19 and all the children are in safe.

### **C.3. Combat Domestic Violence and Human Trafficking:**

Fellowship has been playing a key role in the state to combat trafficking since 1999. The secretary of Fellowship, Mr. S.M. Farooque is the State Convener of ATSEC, a regional level network headquartered in Kolkata, India. Centre for World Solidarity (CWS), Hyderabad sanctioned a grant-in-aid to work in five Districts Anugul, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapada and Puri to address the issue of trafficking in persons especially women and girl. As part of intervention strategies Marriage Registrations, Public awareness, Economic rehabilitation of the returnees, ensuring anti-trafficking call functional and Training of the law enforcement are some major activities in focus areas.

### **C. 4. Other Activities**

On 25<sup>th</sup> November, on the occasion of International Day to End Violence against Women, a public meeting was organized in the districts. The event was organized at Chandigaon as well as at our SAKHI, One Stop Centre with about 1100 and 83 people participated respectively including Govt. officials respectively. They were sensitized on different aspects of trafficking and violence against women.

### **C.5. Awareness Programme on Covid-19.**

We have organised five awareness programmes in Bhadrak block areas during the pandemic period. Inmates of our Swadher Greh periodically prepared the home made masks and our staffs distributed the same in the meeting along with other relief s such as cooked and dry food, soap, santizer etc. Apart from this we arranged for vaccination of the needy people in the villages.

### **C.5. Livelihood support Programme:**

Under Livelihood Support programme we identified some women beneficiaries who are economically poor and prone to trafficking. We have provided them direct cash benefit to initiate some income generation activity to sustain their livelihood. Three such women have been provided with the support in Bhadrak for this year.

### **C.6.HIV/AIDS**

#### **C.6.1. Targeted Interventions (TI) Project:**

Targeted Interventions (TI) are a specific set of intervention in HIV/AIDS Control programme meant specifically to reach out to groups seen to practice high-risk behavior known as HRG (High Risk GROUP). HRGs are divided into Core Groups comprising Female Sex Workers (FSWs), Injecting Drug (IDUs) and Men having Sex with Men (MSM). The goal is to saturate coverage of high-risk groups. Apart from prevention of HIV infection, this facilitates prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases as they increase the risk of HIV infection, and are linked to care, support and treatment services. The main components of the TI projects are Behavior Change Communication, Condom Promotion, STI care and treatment, Enabling environment, Community organization and ownership building, Linkage with service.

We are implementing the TI Project in Bhadrak in collaboration and support of Odisha State AIDS Control Society (OSACS) since 2006. As on March, 2022 we are working with 442 FSWs and 219 MSM and 50TG.

The TI project of Fellowship has extended its work to form CBOs among FSWs and MSM. Two community based organization has been formed, one in FSW sector named SAKHI and another is SANTISEVA in MSM sector. Now Santiseva is self sufficient and Sakhi is crawling. Both are having legal entity and they are registered under India Trust Act. They have got success for liasioning with different agencies. The CBOs also arranged meetings and seminar on the eve of International Sex Workers Rights Day (3<sup>rd</sup> March, 2021) and International Women's Day (8<sup>th</sup> March, 2021). They are taking leading role to take the advocacy program ahead on different issues like pension for Sex Workers, Education for the children of FSWs and fighting against discrimination towards Transgender.

#### **C.6.2. Economic Rehabilitation:**

Two community based groups of MSMs have been formed in Bhadrak (Santiseva – 52 members) and Dhusuri (Saraswati – 31 members). Both the CBOs are registered under Trust Act in Bhadrak. This is the first CBO of Maichiya and Hijra. 22 members of the Santiseva group have been financially supported for self-employment. Santiseva, the CBO is functioning independently since 2012. Under social entitlement schemes, 7 HRGs received Ration Cards, 4 HRGs received labour Cards, 130 were linked to Pradhan Mantri Jandhan Yojana and Pradhan Mantri Surakhya Yojana.

### **C.6.3 Helpline for MSM:**

A “Telephonic H-line” for MSM, Hijra & Maichiya is running in our office since last three years. A telephone number is working especially for counseling service.

### **C.6.3. Action for Socio-legal protection of Persons living with HIV:**

Persons Living with HIV (PLHIV) face unspeakable discrimination in the society as well as in the families. With the objective to protect their rights, we launched a project called Action for Socio-legal Protection (ASLP) of PLHIV in the district since July 2012. The main objective this project is to aware the PLHIV about various social benefit schemes in GO & NGO sectors and creating avenues for linkages.

## **D. SAKHI, ONE STOP CENTRE**

One Stop Centre is functioning since 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2019. This SAKHI, One Stop Centre is located at Old Collectorate, Bhadrak. The project seeks to provide integrated support and assistance to women affected by violence both in public and private place. To facilitate immediate emergency and non-emergency access to range of service including medical, legal, psychological and counselling support under one roof to fight against any form violence against women. From 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2019 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022, 494 cases on different issues of women were registered. Out of which 324 cases have been solved and assistance such as Police Assistance, Medical Assistance, Legal Assistance, Psycho-Social Counselling, Shelter and other helps were provided. With our performance we have been selected one of the best OSC performing perfectly during covid period out of ten OSC of Odisha selected by WHO.

## **E. PRADHAN MANTRI ADARSHA GRAMYA YOJANA (PMAGY)-**

The District Authority has sanctioned a project since Feb, 2021 under the name “Pradhan Mantri Adasha Gramya Yojana (PMAGY)”. The objective of this Project / Scheme is to ensure integrated development of the selected villages with more than



50% SC population, inter alia, there is: (a) Adequate Infrastructure: All requisite infrastructure necessary for the socio-economic development needs are to be provided under the Scheme. To implement this scheme we have to form VLC, undertake house hold Survey, Uploading of Data in PMAGY, Need Assessment of the villages & Preparation of VDPs etc. Till date we have completed in all 12 villages Development Plan (VDP) of Tihidi & Chandabali block under Bhadrak district in collaboration with D.W.O, W.E.O & BDO. By reviewing our performance OSFDC (St & Sc Dev. Section) is satisfied particularly of fulfilling the commitment of their, they have again allotted 24 villages in six blocks of Bhadrak district.

#### **F. FOOD & NUTRITION SECURITY (FNS)-**

Food and Nutrition Security (FNS) programme that aims to integrate nutrition, agriculture and WASH interventions for improved food and nutrition security using participatory planning and behavior change communication method in twelve villages of Kadabaruan & Chandigaon panchayat of Bhadrak block. We are working on the project with the support of Centre For World Solidarity (CWS), Secunderabad since June, 2021. We are conducting several activities for our beneficiaries (lactating mother, pregnant women, adolescent girls, children 0 to 59 months) in all 12 villages under this project. We have enrolled 12 of health volunteers (one in each village), conducted three trainings to village/ health volunteers for their capacity building. We have also conducted baseline survey to find out status of children and found 14 children are in red zone and 30 children in yellow zone. We have organised different activities in our all operational villages like; Infant and young child feeding (IYCF) practices and Diet Diversity, 15 days Poshan Camp, Diet Diversity Score Survey, Demonstration of home based Nutrimix and recipe, Recipe demonstration on Millets/UCF etc. and lost foods, Workshops on promotion of Sanitations / Menstrual Hygiene, Promotion of sustainable agriculture practices – Trainings and Promotion of Hand Wash provisions /Tippy Tap method etc. We have constructed four wash basins in four Anganwadi Centres. We have provided input support for diverse crop / methods/tools to 24 identified farmers. We have also provided support of seeds packet, 16 different siblings to the 250 beneficiaries for developing nutrigarden. After our intervention the number of red zone and yellow zone children reduced to 9 & 21 simultaneously.

### Case study -I

Sabana Parween , W/o Sk Sahid, At:- Bishnupurbindha, Po:- Arnnapal, P.S:- Bhadrak (R), Dist:-Bhadrak. She was married on 17<sup>th</sup> August 2013.

This case was referred by Protection Officer (PO) to our OSC and her case was registered her case on 01.09.2020. This case is something Peculiar. Here the complain of Sabana is that she along with her husband being tortured physically and mentally by her father-in-law, mother-in-law, younger brother-in-law. Sabana was very affirmative and in bent of mind and expressed to her husband that “If you cannot protect your wife then do not think that I am weak. I can sustain and fight against this domestic violence at any level”. She approached PO madam and in turn PO referred the case to OSC.

Our team visited to her in-law house and her in-laws are in different attitude and opined that their son (Huaband of Sabana) is useless, hopeless and no earning and they will not allow their son and daughter in-law to stay in the home and to go out from house, earn their livelihood and stay separately outside. With serious of counselling and discussion we have invoked Sec.17 of DV Act 2005 and told her in-laws that every daughter-in-law has right for Share Housing in husband’s parental property, whether husband has got earning or not. We have summoned the opposite party to OSC and made two/three joint sessions. Ultimately our emotional threaten for legal action brought her father-in-law to understanding and they agreed to construct a separate house for her son and daughter-in-law build a separate within 6 months with all such facilities such as bedroom, dining, toilet, tube well etc. We have taken undertaking from in-laws that till they shift to the newly constructed house, they should not be a single harassment during this six months otherwise they will fall under the prey of legal action.

And scrupulously we have followed the case regularly and within six months Sabana Parween shifted to the new house on 05.05.2021 with her husband and two children and the said house was registered in her name. Now she is earning with her own effort and by seeing the activities of Sabana, her husband is also doing daily labouring. We have succeeded in the case with SWOT analyses by observing the mental strength of Sabana and we could learn that it is not a success story but it is woman empowerment.



### Case Study OSC, Bhadrak-II

Arati Mohapatra aged 35 years W/o- Trilochan Mohaptara of village Bandhagon was rescued from her house at 9.30 PM on 25th December, 2021 by the staff of our OSC being physically and mentally assaulted by her husband. She became the second wife of her husband after the death of first wife. She was sheltered at our OSC for five days. Her issue was extramarital affairs with one priest who used to come to her house for Chandi path. Her husband, children, mother, brother and few villagers came to OSC and apologized and urge upon her return to home; But she was unwilling and asked OSC to give her support for a divorce. One advocate was also on her side and wanted to file quick divorce petition and collected the gold ornaments from her. As the situation was grave we forwarded her to our Swadher Greh for stay. There was series of counselling at our Swadher Greh even we took the help of Addl SP who joined in the counselling for the joint session. The Priest was also summoned by ASP and was threatened for his activities because he is also a married man. That also failed. But we did not lose hope. All sorts of promises and hopes were given to her jointly by counsellor of OSC & Swadher Greh. Ultimately we succeeded in our venture after the series of exercise for 43 days and on 08<sup>th</sup> February, 2022 she was restored to her family and as of now she is staying happily with her husband and children.
